







1772 - a new owner



- Henry Gott bought Newland Park
 - Added two wings to the Manor
- Extensive improvements to grounds





1903 - 1922: a place of influence and Society




After the First World War



- Thomas Hutchinson altered the interior of the Manor House considerably
- Replaced the stair case
- Changed the Georgian front door to Tudor style
- The Great Hall was lined with stone
- Wood panelling was stained dark




1941 - 1946


1975 - Higher Education Commences
